Walking and cycling

A great destination for walking in Norfolk, and part of Walkers are Welcome UK. With its regular bus services, cafés, independent shops, local food and Cittaslow status (recognising the quality of life), Aylsham offers so much for visitors. Two long-distance trails converge on the town, the Marriott's Way and Weavers Way plus the Bure Valley Path. There's also a number of shorter walks, both linear and circular, to and around local villages and attractions.

MARRIOTT'S WAY

At 26 miles this is one of the longest off-road routes in the country. It follows the track bed of the railway line which ran between Norwich and

Aylsham, finishing opposite the Bure Valley Railway Station.



WEAVERS WAY

A 61-mile walking route from Cromer to Great Yarmouth, passing through Aylsham. Its name comes from the cloth industry which gave enormous wealth to the area. Some parts of the route are also suitable for bikes.

BURE VALLEY PATH

Meeting with the Marriott's Way, this

nine-mile path follows part of the route of the narrow-gauge Bure Valley Railway between Aylsham and Wroxham.



SUSTRANS REGIONAL ROUTE 33

Between Aylsham, Blickling Hall and Felbrigg Hall, it takes advantage of the existing quiet lanes that crisscross this part of North Norfolk. Signed from Aylsham Market Place, across the beautiful NT Blickling Estate and then continuing on quiet roads to Felbrigg Hall. A total of 13 miles.

Aylsham Heritage Walk

Follow this short walk around the town looking out for the seven heritage boards, see map, which tell you about the local history and what there is to see.



We are starting at the Buttsland car park at Board A, but you can start at any board and then follow in alphabetical

A. The Buttsland

It is easy to see the long, narrow shape of this area, and to imagine the archery butts at one end, and the archers firing from the other. Walk straight ahead from the car park and you will come out by the John Soame Memorial Pump which was used to draw water until 1938. Bear right along Penfold Street to The Market Place, left past the Black Boys Inn, to the churchyard entrance.

B. St. Michael's and All Angels

Follow the path down towards the Lychgate and you will find the Heritage Centre on the right near the War Memorial. It is home to collections and different exhibitions relating to Aylsham's heritage. Retrace your steps to the Market Place and the Town Hall.

C. The Market Place

This is a good place to get the feel of Aylsham as a market town and there are often market stalls here as there have been for centuries. From the Market Place walk alongside the Town Hall into Red Lion Street and cross over to the right into Blofield's Loke.

D. Red Lion Street

Just about every building is listed as being of historic interest. Most date back to the 17th century, with the

shop fronts rebuilt, often in Victorian times. There were once five inns along this street and the yards of three of them can still be seen. Continue along Blofield's Loke to the car park.

E. Burgh Road Car Park

The board here tells the history of the town, the look of the town, tourist information, shopping, and getting about. Cross the car park to the Burgh Road entrance, turn right to the corner at the end of Red Lion Street. You are now outside the Bridewell, with its corner removed to ease the way for traffic. Cross the road in to the Market Place and continue towards the Black Boys then turn left into Hungate Street. The information board is a few metres along on the right immediately after the Unicorn public house.

F. Hungate

Hungate Street is the original main road from Norwich to Cromer. There are houses of character and yards which would have been home to many people and trades. A walk along this street will reveal houses of many periods and styles. Continue through Unicorn Yard and along the footpath to return to the Buttsland car park.

Bure Valley Railway Station

There is one further information board at the Bure Valley Railway Station which is 600 metres from the town centre on the left of the Norwich Road. This provides information about the two railway stations that once existed in the town and about the Aylsham Navigation, which closed after the Great Flood of 1912.
